#### Part B 1.3 Feedback from Stakeholders

Feedback was obtained from parents and students. A brief description of the methods followed for eliciting feedback is as follows:

- (i) Parents: Feedback was obtained from parents at the time of collection of semester-end examination mark-sheets. In order to sensitize parents about the academic progress of their wards, results are handed over to parents of students of BA/BCom by respective mentors. The parents were asked to fill in the questionnaire provided to them. The feedback form/questionnaire covered questions pertaining to college infrastructure facilities such as library, canteen, etc, career guidance, student mentoring and counselling, sport/cultural/extracurricular activities, extension activities, holistic education etc. On analyzing the feedback of the parents, necessary action is taken wherever necessary. The parents are also requested to visit the college every month to interact with the subject teachers and mentors so as to know about their wards academic performance, discipline and attendance in the class.
- (ii) Students: The students convey their grievances, if any, to faculty members, mentors, Vice-Principal, Principal, as well as to the professional Counsellor who is available twice a week. The students also communicate their feedback during College Council meetings. The feedback received from students covers issues like canteen facilities, occasional non-functioning of fan/tube-light, participation in inter-collegiate events, etc.

In addition to the above, feedback of students is also obtained through a specially designed faculty evaluation form. The student provides feedback about the faculty on five broad parameters, namely, discipline, subject knowledge, imparting knowledge, use of teaching aids and teachers attitude towards students. Based on the faculty evaluation by students, each teacher provides a summary (in a specified format) to the Head of Department, who further submits a report to the IQAC.. The Principal, on going through the same, accordingly redresses the matter wherever the need arises.

#### 7.3 Best Practices of the Institution

The College has a number of Best Practices. The two best practices are as follows:

(i) Remedial coaching classes: Under the UGC XII Remedial Coaching Plan, Free Remedial coaching classes were conducted for the students of BA/B.Com belonging to SC/ST/OBC/Minorities/Physically Challenged and students belonging to General Category below poverty line. The Remedial classes commenced from July 2015 and were continued till the end of the academic year 2015-16. Students who have difficulties in any subject avail of the remedial coaching. Teachers engaged remedial classes for the students after 1.00 pm in the subjects in which they had difficulties. The students who registered under remedial coaching scheme were also provided the Remedial book bank scheme through library. The total number of students registered for the remedial classes was 259.

Letters were sent to the parents of students whose percentage was below 45% so as to motivate their wards to attend remedial classes. The performance of the students has improved in the Semester End exams after attending the remedial coaching classes. Evaluation was done of the performance of the students availing the remedial classes for B.Com/B.A Semester I,III,& V. Slow learners benefitted from the classes.

(ii) Appreciation awards to outstanding students: The Appreciation Awards Function 2015-16 were organized on 19<sup>th</sup> March 2016 at 11.30 a.m.in the Seminar Hall of the college. The basic objective of organizing the Appreciation Awards Ceremony was to recognize the talents of the students who have excelled in various fields/events and brought laurels to the college by securing first and second prizes at State, National and International levels and felicitate them at the hands of Chief Guest, who shall be an Outstanding Alumni of the College. This year 126 students pursuing BA/BCOM/BCA Semester II/IV/VI and F.Y/S.Y./T.Y.BBA/BBA Shipping and Logistics, showed outstanding performance in various fields such as NCC (Navy and Army)Men and Women, NSS, Sports, Cultural events, Elocution, Quiz, English Literature, Management and IT Events were felicitated with trophies and certificates.
